**insatiable** (in'sāshəb'l, -shēb'l) adj. or —**insatiate** (shēb'l) adj. not able to be satisfied or sated;永不满足的。 —**in'sat'iability** or **in'sat'iateness** n. —**in'sat'iably** or **in'sat'iately** adv.

**inscape** ('inskāp) n. the essential inner nature of a person, object, etc., as expressed in literary or artistic works. [C19: < IN+<sup>2</sup> + -scape, as in *andscape* coined by Gerard Manley Hopkins (1849-1903), poet]

**inscribe** (in'skrīb) vb. (tr.) 1. to make, carve, or engrave (writing, letters, etc.) on (a surface such as wood, stone, or paper). 2. to enter (a name) on a list or in a register. 3. to sign one's name on (a book, etc.) before presentation to another person. 4. to draw (a geometric construction) inside another construction so that they are in contact but do not intersect. [C16: L *inscribere*; see *INSCRIPTION*] —**in'scribable** adj.; —**in'scribability** n. —**in'scriber** n.

**inscription** (in'skrīpshən) n. 1. something inscribed; esp. words carved or engraved on a stone, tomb, etc. 2. a signature or brief dedication on a book or on a work of art. 3. the act of inscribing. [C14: < L *inscriptio* a writing upon, < *scribere* to write] —**in'scriptional** or **in'scriptive** adj.; —**in'scriptively** adv.

**inscrutab** (in'skrūtab'l) adj. mysterious or enigmatic; incomprehensible. [C15: < LL, < L *in*- + *scrutari* to examine] —**in'scruta'bility** or **in'scrutability** n. —**in'scrutably** adv.

**insect** ('insek't) n. 1. any of a class of small air-breathing arthropods, having a body divided into head, thorax, and abdomen, three pairs of legs, and (in most species) two pairs of wings. 2. (used) any similar invertebrate, such as a spider, tick, or centipede. 3. a contemptible, ignoble, or insignificant person. **insectarium** (in sek'torēəm) or **insectary** (in sek'terē) n., pl. -tarium, -taria (-tērēə, -ōrē), or -aries. a place where living insects are kept, bred, and studied.

**insecticide** (in sek'ti,sid) n. a substance used

to destroy insect pests. —**in'secticidal** adj.

**insectivore** (in'sekti,vōr) n. 1. any of an order of placental mammals, being typically small, with simple teeth, and feeding on invertebrates. The group includes shrews, moles, and hedgehogs. 2. any animal or plant that derives nourishment from insects. —**insec'tivorous** adj.

**insecure** (in'sek'yōr) adj. 1. anxious or afraid; not confident or certain. 2. not adequately protected: an *insecure* fortress. 3. unstable or hasty. —**in'sec'urely** adv.; —**in'sec'ureness** n.

**inselberg** ('inz̄l'bērg) n. an isolated rocky hill rising abruptly from a flat plain. [*< G.* < *Insel* island + *Berg* mountain]

**inseminate** (in'semīnāt') vb. (tr.) 1. to impregnate (a female) with semen. 2. to introduce (ideas or attitudes) into the mind of (a person or group). [C17: < L *inseminare*, < IN<sup>2</sup> + *semīnare* to sow, < *semēn* seed] —**in'semīna'tion** n. —**in'semīnat'or** n.

**insentient** (in'senʃənt) adj. lacking consciousness or sense; inanimate. —**in'sentience** n.

**inset** vb. (in'sēt), -**setting**, -**set**. 1. (tr.) to set or place in or within; insert. ~n.
